

# Health and Human Services



- Mentally or physically disabled people who can't work and will lose healthcare from the state through General Assistance-Unemployable: **6,000**
  - Residential facilities for developmentally disabled that will close: **1**
- Amount cut from the WorkFirst program which helps unemployed people find jobs: **5 percent**
  - Number of unemployed Washingtonians in March 2009: **327,442**
  - Amount cut from low-income drug treatment services: **25 percent**
  - Amount cut from low-income detoxification services: **50 percent**
- Number of children and adults in Washington who needed alcohol or drug treatment in 2007: **130,389**
  - Number of people who received alcohol or drug treatment in 2007: **41,830**
- Number of people applied for alcohol and drug abuse treatment from the state in 2007, but were waitlisted: **1,397**
- Professionals cut from the budget who help parents obtain services when chemical dependency may be a factor in abuse or neglect of their children: **69 percent**
- Number of parents who are referred to chemical dependency programs each year on average: **6,192**
- Approximate number of parents who will not be referred to chemical dependency programs each year: **4,273**
  - Number of foster children in Washington: **10,000**
- Cuts to the "continuum of care," which provides a variety of services for at-risk families, including parenting classes, referrals to drug treatment programs, and other preventative resources: **90 percent**
- Number of foster care kids who turn 18 after July 2009 and receive help transitioning to adulthood including college: **0**
  - Number of new Intensive Resource Homes that will be available for foster children with severe needs: **0**
- Number of secure facility beds that will be left in the state who can hold runaway children for five days to determine their situation: **45**
  - Cut to the street youth outreach program for runaway children: **100 percent**
